## GUIDELINES FOR EAGLE SCOUT LEADERSHIP PROJECT APPROVAL APPOINTMENTS

### 1- Appointments:

- a. Held Monthly at the Anderson County Library in the Second Floor Conference Rooms as follows:
  - i. Last Thursday of each month starting at 7:00 pm – Eagle Projects Approvals are done prior to Eagle Boards of Review
  - ii. **Note:** November and December each year the dates may vary, be sure to check in advance.
- b. Contact Terry King – Blue Ridge Council: District 6 & 20 Eagle Board Chair

**NOTE:** do not just show up, you need to make an appointment in advance.
- c. The Eagle Candidate is responsible to make the appointment, not the Scoutmaster, Adult Troop Leader or the Parent or Legal Guardian of the Eagle Candidate.
- d. For questions or advice an Eagle candidate may call or send e-mail prior to requesting an approval meeting. However, all final approvals of your Eagle Scout Leadership Project are to be done in person, **NOT** via email or over the phone.
- e. What to wear or not to wear: Complete Class A Uniform as outlined below:
  - i. Class A Uniform Shirt – with all of the proper patch placements, rank insignia, and leadership positions in the proper place.
  - ii. Neckerchief & Slide **OR** BSA approved Bolo Tie (Optional)
  - iii. Meritbadge Sash with all of the meritbadges earned and awarded sewn in place. The Sash should be worn and never folded over the belt.

- iv. Scout Hat – please leave at home, this meeting is inside.
- v. OA Sash – please leave at home, OA Sash should only be worn at OA events.
- vi. Scout Pants OR Scout Shorts
- vii. BSA approved Scout Belt and Belt Buckle
- viii. Scout Socks (Optional)

f. Additional Items to bring:

- i. BSA Scout Manual - it may be used as a reference guide.
- ii. Eagle Scout Leadership Project Manual as outlined below
- iii. Pad and writing object

- b. **Note:** failure to be in proper uniform or bring the proper items may cause a delay in the approval of your Eagle Scout Leadership Project approval until such time that the next District Review of Eagle Scout Leadership projects is scheduled to take place.

2- Below are Guidelines (not requirements) for what is an acceptable Eagle Scout Leadership Project: When you think of an Eagle Scout Leadership Service Project, you should ask yourself the following question;

- Is this project truly “Eagle Caliber”? (See Section at the end of this document for examples of past projects)
- Examples and Guidelines are listed below:
  - a. Is it visible and lasting?
  - b. If I come back to see my Eagle Project after 5, 10, 15 years is it still there and is it something I can still be proud of? – NOTE: does not apply for “Service” type projects.
  - c. Is it of sufficient size to involve multiple people performing multiple tasks?
  - d. Will it provide you with the opportunity to exert and demonstrate leadership?
- These are all key questions to ask yourself prior to presenting your project.

- Routine labor should never be considered for an Eagle Scout Leadership Project. If it is a job or service normally rendered such as clean-up, yard work, maintenance, storage or space reorganization, office work, etc. (these things can be included as part of a good Eagle Scout Leadership Project) – it has potential for a good Unit service project opportunity, but it is not acceptable as an Eagle Scout Leadership Project.
- Work involving BSA, Council, District, Unit Properties, or for the benefit of Scouting is not acceptable, likewise, no projects may be performed for the benefit of a private or commercial business or be of a commercial nature.
- Fundraisers are never acceptable as Eagle Scout Leadership Projects; raising funds to purchase materials or soliciting donated materials can and should be a component of the project. Your project is a test of leadership to others, not fundraising.
- There is no minimum number of hours that must be spent on carrying out an Eagle Scout Leadership Project. The amount of time spent must be sufficient for the Scout to clearly demonstrate leadership skills. While there is no set minimum, most projects, on average, are in the range of 40 hours or more. (40 hours or greater, is more than enough to demonstrate a Scout's leadership abilities; project that are much larger may turn out to be much more than a Scout, or Unit, can handle)

### 3- All of the following items **MUST** be available at final approval meeting:

- Project Description – clear communication of the projects plan is essential. Poor communication of the plan will result in your having to rewrite it before it will be approved.
- Clarify who your project will benefit, and how they will benefit from it.
- Project Details – include backup plans in case original plans may not work.
- Estimated timeline for the event (number of persons required and time to complete the project – Example: Building Benches – 3 persons – 4 hours each.
- Plan for recruiting help and who will be helping – Example: Scout Troop, Church, or other organizations.
- Sign in/out Sheets (draft)

- Time Log – how you will record everyone’s time
- How you will get the required materials – fundraising, donations, etc. State your specific plans to raise funds or who specifically you will be securing donations from for your materials or equipment needed.
- Safety Plan – include a paragraph discussing possible hazards and how these hazards will be avoided or minimized. Remember you will need two adults (one a registered scouter) at your project at all times and that you must avoid the use of power tools by Scouts. Youth Protection and the Guide to Safe Scouting must be followed at all times and documented in your plans.
- Detail, Detail, and more Detail: Your plans should be clear enough that anyone familiar with the project should be able to pick up your Eagle Scout Leadership Project manual and complete the project based upon what is detailed out in your Eagle Scout Leadership Project Manual plans.
- Approval signatures from:
  - Project sponsoring organization representative
  - Unit leader/scoutmaster
  - Unit committee chairperson (preferred) OR Unit committee advancement chair
- As appropriate for project:
  - Flier (draft)
  - Materials/Supplies List
  - Budget/Cost List
  - Tools list
  - Sign up sheets
  - Plans/drawings/cutting diagrams
  - Draft thank you letter for donations
  - Clean-up issues if required

- 4- All projects are to be neatly typed or hand written (if hand written, written legibly using black or blue ink) using the online template of the Eagle Scout Leadership Project. An Microsoft Word version of the Eagle Scout Service Project Workbook is available at: [www.nesa.org/PDF/18-936.doc](http://www.nesa.org/PDF/18-936.doc)
  - a. **See Separate File Attachment on the Council/District Website with “Real” Eagle Scout Leadership Project – filled out as an example of what is required.**
- 5- Projects should be neatly presented and organized. A three ring binder with sheet protectors is recommended.
- 6- No specific dates should be set until after the project is approved. Dates in the write-up are **TENTATIVE** dates only.
- 7- Appointments for approvals should be made at least 4 weeks prior to when the scout wants to do the project. This will allow for re-writes etc. assuming there may be issues with the initial approvals. If you wish to e-mail the Eagle Scout Leadership Document in advance of your Council / District 6 & 20 approval meeting for clarifications etc. you are welcome to do so.
- 8- **All approvals must be obtained before starting work on an Eagle Project, however, all of the planning and approval process may be included in the Scout’s time log for both the Scout as well as any person they interact with to gain the project approval.**

### Reference Section – Example of Eagle Scout Leadership Projects

**Eagle Scout Leadership Projects Ideas** – these are titles of projects only, however, they should help stimulate ideas for your Eagle Scout Leadership Project.

**NOTE: the projects listed below are broken up into the following categories:**

**A. Constructed Related, B. Outdoors / Environmental / Landscape,  
C. Service / Collections, D. Other**

#### **Construction-Related:**

- Design and build a playhouse for pre-school playground
- Design and construct wheelchair access ramps and sidewalks at college ministry house
- Remove unsafe space heaters and rebuild walls; then build bookshelves on same walls
- Design and built 10' X 10' shot-put and discus throwing circle with toe guard at local middle school
- Design and construct a bus stop shelter
- Designed and built rolling media carts for use of critically ill cancer patients at local hospital
- Construct a fence and landscaping for new home for Habitat for Humanity
- Design, build and erect two radio antennae and towers for Civil Air Patrol
- Build new roof for church bell tower and refurbish bell
- Build and install 14 benches for outside chapel at school
- Disassembly, repair, move, and reassemble donated outdoor gym set for playground area
- Design and build doghouses and donate to local animal shelter
- Plan, build, and install a portable stage with backdrop and curtains for local school
- Design and construct a raptor cage for injured hawks at wildlife center
- Build instrument racks for storing band instruments at local school
- Built twelve bookcases, held book drive to fill shelves, and obtained mini-blinds for recreation room at rehabilitation center
- Built and assembled weaving loom for senior citizens' home
- Designed and built outdoor chapel for church
- Build and install picnic tables at church in south Texas
- Build a 5-station "ROPES" course for local church youth group
- Design, build and paint stage fronts for children's chapel activities
- Built electrically-operated game board to teach Bible facts to children at church
- Made Braille games for blind school students, including handmade game boards, playing pieces, etc., that could be identified by touch
- Built storage bins for nursery schools
- Construct six mobile, wooden planters, for use by children confined to wheelchairs at Shriner's Hospital

- Repaired and painted community building, including raising funds to pay for supplies
- Constructed footbridge linking school and homes
- Designed and built reading lofts for kindergarten classes freeing up valuable floor space
- Built clothes racks for Christmas gift program, providing place to store coats and other donated clothing items until distribution
- Designed, built, and installed two map signs identifying ball diamonds and playing fields at community sports complex
- Construct and stain 20 podiums for classrooms at church
- Design and construct tennis backboards at city tennis courts
- Constructed cabinets and shelves and secured library of written materials for cardiac rehab center to provide education on measured and actions to help prevent strokes and heart attacks
- Built and maintained recycling center at local park by installing separating bins and emptying for six months
- Rebuilt outdoor chapel at church camp by removing and replacing all benches, adding railings to pathway and stairs and building new lectern and cross
- Refurbished area and constructed two new horseshoe pits and bocce ball court for senior citizens of chartered organization.
- Collected, repaired, painted, and delivered toys to toy lending library at Salvation Army for distribution to needy children
- Erected poles as road guards around driveway at church for playground and day-care
- Built storage facilities for Sunday school materials
- Repaired and repainted bleachers at school
- Built fire pit and benches and cleaned up beachfront property of church
- Built campfire bowl and stage for local youth camp
- Planned, organized, and built baseball field for church
- Rebuild a cabin and constructed outhouse at church camp
- Re-shingled roofs on nature center buildings
- Constructed kiosk to be used as message center, map holder and information center at community park
- Cleared unused building at Boy's Club and constructed indoor archery range
- Planned and built brick fireplace for Local Park
- Built large playhouse (6'X12'X8') for day-care and after-school program run for homeless in community
- Erected enclosure, following specifications provided by the zoo, for display and safekeeping of birds, at local wildlife park
- Build an outdoor weather station and installed professional grade weather equipment at elementary school
- Constructed activity shelter at local school
- Dismantled, recycled wood and disposed of remaining portion of dilapidated garage at historic home

- Built doghouses of various sizes for homeless animals being kept at various animal shelters
- Constructed two bridges along trail at nature center
- Built play gyms for schools and Ronald McDonald House
- Rebuild historical bus stop for seniors
- Build a trophy case for local grade school
- Built equipment for Special Olympics
- Built birdhouses and feeders to be placed outside windows at local nursing homes
- Repaired and repainted press box and dugouts at athletic field
- Made major structural repairs to community-owned park cabin
- Constructed study carrels at nonprofit adult literacy organization
- Built and distributed lap boards with tablets or writing paper and holders for pens and envelopes to rest homes and VA hospital and with coloring books and crayons for children's hospital
- Assembled book carts, kick stools and bookends for new public library and relocated and sorted children's catalog section
- Procured materials and constructed six motorized wheelchairs for permanent use by home for the elderly
- Dismantle and rebuild wooden bleachers at school
- Built wooden lifeguard towers at local YMCA camp
- Built 4 rolling tables for chartered organization
- Constructed three voting booths for town hall including one handicap-accessible
- Designed and built a playground for orphanage
- Built new picnic tables for town park pavilion
- Built bicycle racks for a local baseball complex
- Repaired/rebuilt a storage shed at local neighborhood park
- Repaired and repainted bleachers and dugouts at local little league baseball diamond
- Removed old flagpole and installed new one at local school; landscaped area around the flagpole
- Built wood shelving units for local food pantry
- Design and build wood working benches for preschool children
- Plan and construct soccer field by removing rocks, hauling in dirt, and installing goals
- Plan and construct a sand volleyball court at church to benefit youth groups
- Convert a storage room into a "cry room" at church by installing one way mirror and sound insulation.
- Build ten outdoor swing sets for camp for disabled children.
- Design and build shade shelters for New City Park.
- Design and construct planter boxes for school learning center.
- Design and build stacking cabinets for storage of choir music books.
- Construct a paved path between church buildings and playground.

- Repairing old cages and building new rabbit cages for *Wild Rescue*, an animal rescue group.
- Build enclosed shelving units to store linens at local shelter.
- Design and paint a mural at senior center.
- Build a 40' wall to form a hallway; install sheetrock and finish painting.
- Rebuild and repair children's play area at ER of local hospital.
- Design and build a security fence separating children's playground from RR tracks.
- Build six portable stages for classroom at school.
- Build an aviary for songbirds.
- Design and build a storage shed for nature preserve.
- Design and build student mailboxes for classroom use.
- Built a large enclosed storage/shelving unit for science lab in inner city school.
- Repair parking lot; re-stripe; and create better access by constructing paths to parking lots.
- Plan and construct a covered bench area for playground supervision at elementary school.
- Design and construct the foundation and base for statue honoring servicemen
- Design and construct entrance signs for local camp
- Repair and resurface kitchen floor at local soup kitchen
- Plan and construct track and field event pits at local school
- Repair existing bed frames and construct an additional 26 frames for use at animal shelter
- Design and construct a sand volleyball court for church youth center

#### Outdoors / Environmental / Landscape:

- Construct a campsite including raised sleeping platforms and fire ring and tables at a Dallas County correctional facility for youths
- Design, construct and install a trailhead kiosk with benches at wilderness trailhead
- Create a trail connecting two city parks and create erosion barriers to keep trail in shape
- Build a long fence to separate volleyball courts from RR tracks
- Construct a handicap accessible sidewalk at local playground area
- Design, layout and build a grass farm for use of Corps of Engineers on future area projects
- Construct an underground sprinkler system to provide water to flower beds on church grounds
- Plan and build a "Biblical reference garden" to accent the entryway of local church
- Design and construct a celebration rose garden for cancer victims and survivors
- Design and install outdoor lighting for flag and cross at local church
- Construct three erosion control dams to prevent erosion of new trail
- Constructed an archery range at local youth camp
- Build a climbing traversing wall for use of local youth group
- Built 30' retaining wall with native rocks to control erosion and water bars on trail in preserve
- Built new orienteering course at park
- Initiated and completed two mile nature trail exhibiting trees, plants, and wildlife; also built a dozen birdhouses to uses as a sanctuary over winter and nesting seasons

- Researched local bird population and constructed and installed over eighty different nesting stations to enhance population of desired bird species at local wildlife park
- Design and construct twenty bird feeding stations for installation outside nursing home windows.
- Rejuvenated cemetery by cleaning grounds, refurbishing headstones, and locating graves; documented 300 buried there and secured cemetery's inclusion in state historical directory
- Built small park on unused wooded lot in neighborhood by clearing and covering two walking paths with wood chips, installing wire spool tables, clearing play area, building sand box, and making entrance sign
- Made insect collection for school of children with disabilities by collecting, identifying and giving locations of prime sites for insect collection; constructed glass cases for presentation and for future collections
- Cleared away brush and overgrowth blocking scenic view and installed resting bench for joggers; installed three posts to prevent vehicles from driving on jogging path
- Made and posted warning signs and location markers on trail for hikers; dug drainage ditches and laid rock and logs to route stagnant water off trail and into river; installed terracing steps and rope handrails to help ensure safety of hikers
- Removed gravel border along sides of walk (potential hazard to elderly) and replaced with fill dirt and sod
- Removed seven trees and brush and cleared area for Red Cross building project; cut up trees and delivered wood to those in need for heating their homes
- Researched and laid out historical hike around city in cooperation with historical society
- Laid out and built outdoor environment and nature study course with assistance of educational naturalist
- Leveled and repaired twenty fitness stations in cooperation with local parks and recreation division
- Developed plan to revitalize live oak trees on college campus by aerating compacted soil, adding topsoil and creating physical barriers around the trees
- Mulched and landscaped parking area and installed handicapped ramp to access picnic area
- Designed and built flower beds for main entrance of school
- Reconstructed and landscaped steep bank behind church sanctuary
- Mapped sector of wildlife refuge to determine contents and populations of area
- Created wildlife kits for state game and parks group to be used in school systems – cleaned skulls of animals and set up displays for kits
- Cleared and widened fire road in forest to make it passable
- Refurbished war memorial and beautified landscaping for memorial Day festivities
- Designed and built prayer garden for church recreation center

- Planted shade trees in Municipal Park after consulting with state forestry experts to select best varieties for climate. Assigned scouts to care for seedlings for one year.
- Created flower parks with welcome signs at entrances to communities
- Built signs for interpretive trails telling history of area
- Landscaped public library and installed a handicap ramp.
- Created an 18<sup>th</sup> century herb garden
- Created azalea garden and meditation bench for chartered organization
- Solved and corrected rainwater problem in children's playground of chartered organization
- Cleared wheelchair and visually-impaired trail; built and installed wooden distance markers; made tape recording about park and donated cassette recorder and headphones; made and posted flyers on bulletin boards about availability of tape
- Built a memorial park in name of an accident victim
- Distributed water conservation pamphlets and installed 576 water-saving devices donated by public utility
- Built ten bat "hotels" for state park to help keep insects in check
- Pond rehabilitation and clean up: restructured pond in town park; planted ground cover to prevent erosion; cleaned garbage and sediment from pond
- Designed and built shelters over tiger cages at local zoo
- Built two grade-level steps to prevent erosion of local wildlife trail; filled in low areas
- Built a boat dock at a park used by local Webelos dens
- Build trash containers and install them at local nature center
- Located and mapped using GPS all storm sewer inlets in city area and posted "No Dumping" signs.
- Repair bridge understructure and install erosion control structures at local campground.
- Install new signs and brochure boxes at local nature preserve.
- Repair and resurface state historical marker signs at local historical park
- Improve native habitat by removal of invasive species and re-introduction of native vegetative species
- Installation of bollards to prevent unauthorized vehicular traffic in wildlife area
- Creek and native habitat restoration involving native species introduction of flora and fauna at local park

- Collect used bicycles; repair bikes; donate to needy kids; and conduct bicycle rodeo

- Conduct a drive, collect and sort and package care parcels for National Guard troop stationed overseas. Held book drive, sold books to pay for shipping of care packages.
- Conducted a media drive benefiting service men and women in Afghanistan and Iraq; delivered media to a local USO center.
- Organize drive to collect candy; re-bag and distributed 2,800 bags as Christmas treats to needy families.
- Collected weathered American flags, designed and wrote guide book on flag retirement ceremonies, trained team to demonstrate ceremonies at Cub packs, scout troops, and local schools.
- Installed padding in bottom of church book racks to deaden sound of dropping books in sanctuary
- Refurbished home for church to be used for homeless family
- Restored refrigerated boxcar for railway museum
- Inventoried, catalogued and transferred all church music to new music facility
- Organized monthly activities at nursing home
- Coordinated parking services at church for one year
- Provided drug abuse and awareness training for youth and educators
- Plan and conduct a Dyslexia awareness campaign and a book drive benefiting the children's learning differences testing program at a local hospital.
- Removed and replaced all furniture and equipment at school while asbestos was removed
- Organized after-school tutorial program in low-income neighborhood
- Organized and obtained sponsors for needy families
- Refinished and refurbished piano used by high school choir
- Inventoried church property, tagged items, and created video log
- Transferred all books from old library to new library and labeled the shelving at the new library.
- Increased awareness of parents and parents-to-be of importance of reading to their children
- Conduct a food drive; prepare meals for 300+ recipients; deliver food and serve meals to residents of shelter
- Designed and constructed 3'X5' capital campaign plaque for contributors to local charity
- Established system to fingerprint and photograph young children and provide records to parents at no cost
- Developed clothing, food and toy give-away for Christmas for distribution to over 600 families
- Scrubbed and cleaned a section of tombstones at national cemetery and documented the locations of the grave markers
- Recruited and trained coaches and participants for Junior Olympics and organized the games at the event.
- Organized program for teenagers to assist elderly city residents with springtime household project

- Developed clothing donation program which collected 5,000 pounds of clothing and donated it to over 300 families at National Guard Amory
- Canvassed and recorded placement of smoke detectors in 20-block neighborhood; distributed literature demonstrating need, placement, and maintenance of detectors
- Organized after-school tutorial program in low income neighborhood
- Collected 1,200 books and periodicals and established a library at care center
- Organized visitations by Cubs and Scouts to senior citizens' complex to read and run errands for residents
- Distributed window stickers to mark homes with young children and handicapped and senior citizens for emergency personnel

- Constructed a hands-on exhibit on static electricity for children’s museum
- Organized bike safety campaign; trained scouts as inspectors and judges and ran bike rodeo that included bike safety check and safe-bike-riding contest
- Conducted training program for staff members for new 6<sup>th</sup> grade retreat for school district
- Organized a concert in which the Scout’s band played at a local park; admission was food items for homeless shelter
